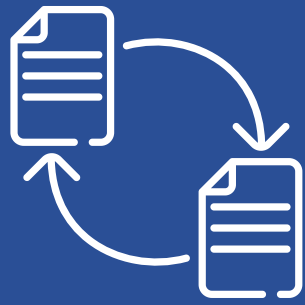




3 Common Challenges Government Departments Encounter With Digital Appraisal

The Public Records Act requires government departments and certain public bodies to transfer records of historical value for permanent preservation to The National Archives (TNA) or Places of Deposit.

Collections of born digital records need to be appraised to determine the need for permanent preservation – or disposition. Moving from the traditional approach used for physical records to born digital records presents a new set of challenges.



Legacy platforms facing obsolescence

Data is being stored in platforms out of support, expensive to maintain, difficult to access, and lack quality metadata or context which requires expensive technical resources for access and reduces the ability to identify records effectively.



Policy and technology becoming out of step

The information management lifecycle has undergone many changes as new technologies have been implemented with policies becoming out dated and the ability or confidence to action, leading to records being over-retained.
